APRIL FOOL

Have you ever been fooled on April 1st?

April Fool's Day is an annual custom occurring each year. It consists of performing jokes and hoaxes. The player of the joke exposes that it is a hoax by shouting APRIL FOOL!

April Fool's Day is also known as 'All Fools' Day, April Noddy Day, Gawkie Day, Huntigawk Day and All Fools' Morn.

Official origins are unknown, although it has been

celebrated for centuries by differing cultures.

In some countries, April Fool's Day is known as 'April Fish'. The 'April Fish' hoax consists of individuals attempting to stick a paper fish on someone's back without being noticed.

Historians have linked April Fool's Day to a festival in Ancient Rome, celebrated at the end of March. It involved people dressing up in disguises.

There is also speculation that April Fool's Day was linked to the first day of Spring in the Northern Hemisphere, when mother nature fooled people with changing, unpredictable weather.

It is also thought that April Fool's Day was popular during the 18th century. In Scotland, the tradition consisted of a two-day event starting with "Hunting the Gawk". People were sent on phoney errands as a hoax. "Hunting the Gawk" was then followed by "Tailie Day". This involved the pinning of fake tails or a "kick me" sign placed on people's "derrieres".

British folklore links April Fool's Day to the town of Gotham in Nottinghamshire. According to the legend, it was tradition in the 13th century for any road that the king placed his foot upon to become public property. The town wanted to refuse him entry, not wishing to lose their main road. When the king heard this, he sent soldiers to the town. When the soldiers arrived at the town, they found foolish activities being carried out. As a result, the king declared the town too foolish to warrant punishment.

Although individual people carry out pranks and hoaxes on April 1st, there have been many carried out by newspapers, TV stations and websites. A famous example of one of these hoaxes occurred on TV when it was reported farmers were experiencing a record spaghetti crop. They went to the extent of showing farmers harvesting the bumper crop of noodles from the trees!

Another outrageous prank caught readers out when it stated that a rookie pitcher could throw a fast ball over 168 miles per hour!

In 1965, a famous hoax was carried out by the BBC. A trial was announced whereby smells were to be broadcast along with regular shows. Apparently, many viewers declared the trial a great success!

April Fool's Day is now a light-hearted celebration but remember if you are planning to play a joke, hoax or prank, it can only be performed until noon on April 1st.

After midday, it is considered to be bad luck and the instigator becomes the April Fool!

Although April Fool's Day can encourage fun and laughter, some people feel it can have negative consequences and be a waste of time.

Whatever your views are about April Fool's Day, have a great day and try not to be caught out by a joke, hoax or prank!

AN EMAIL ADDRESS IS FOR LIFE – OR IS IT?

When most people sign up with an Internet Service Provider, they will be told that they can create an email address, or multiple email addresses, free of charge. This was certainly the case when I registered with Freeserve many years ago.

It has generally been assumed that once you have created an email address you will have access to it, free of charge, for as long as you wish to use it.

Recent developments however, have thrown this theory out of the window. Personally, I was a customer of TalkTalk for several years but moved ISP around five or six years ago. I continued to use my TalkTalk email address as my principal email address for several years after leaving them. I had encountered no issues until approximately two years ago, when I found my access appeared to have been revoked.

Upon contacting customer support, I was informed that as a matter of goodwill my email address would be reinstated but "there was no guarantee" as to how long the address would continue to function. I was also advised to use an alternative email address in future.

During the summer of 2019, I experienced a new access issue. Again, I contacted TalkTalk Customer Support. They said they would look into the problem for me & contact me via mobile phone. Luckily by this stage I had moved access for many online accounts and applications to a Gmail address however, there were still plenty of accounts which still utilised my legacy TalkTalk address. I never received the phone call to confirm the issue had been resolved and I made plans to transfer the remaining accounts to my Gmail address.

Towards the back end of 2019, during a conversation with a friend, I discovered that TalkTalk had introduced a charge of £5 per month or £50 per annum to allow former customers to continue using their legacy email address.

After further investigation I discovered an article published in February of this year in the business section of the BBC website, which revealed that BT charge £7.50 per month for customers who switch away from their service.

Perhaps more disconcerting Virgin Media delete the email addresses it gives to customers 90 days after they leave. On a more positive note Sky lets people keep theirs for free.

Ofcom have now become involved in the argument and have started writing to broadband companies to ask why some people have to pay to keep old email addresses.

They have stated "We're looking at this to consider whether we need to step in and take action."

As it stands, I currently still cannot access my emails that were sent to my TalkTalk address. I have given up on them to be honest but hopefully Ofcom will ensure that, going forward, other customers won't have to go through what I have experienced.

It would be good, at some point in the future, to be able to say, without any doubt, that an email address is for life and not just for the length of the contract with your provider.

TORREMOLINOS



Recently, me and my friend Brenda spent an enjoyable week in Torremolinos, Southern Spain, at a great hotel called La Puenta Real – the aim was for me to have a rest and get over a long-standing chest problem.

Now let's have a brief look at the town:

Torremolinos is situated in Andalusia and is west of Malaga. Before the era of tourism, it was

a small fishing village and was actually the first of the Costa del Sol resorts to be developed. It is particularly popular with the British, Irish and Scandinavian tourists and it also has a large expatriate population. Incidentally, there were 69,389 inhabitants in 2013, and the township covered 20 Square Kilometres.

The resort has a beach which is 8 kilometres in length, and interestingly, there are cycle and skating lanes alongside the promenade. It has one of the best climates in Europe – temperatures are in the 30s in the summer and upper teens in the winter, which makes it a perfect place to take either a winter or summer break.

It is well-known for its exciting all-inclusive nightlife and has numerous bars and clubs catering for the LGBT community. Interestingly, it hosted the World Pride in 2017 in conjunction with Madrid, and it has its own Pride in June.

It is likely that the Romans founded the current town and it is thought that it originally had about 2,000 inhabitants.

Over the years the town has been taken over by people like the Moors, North African pirates and in the eighteenth century was almost destroyed by an Anglo-Dutch flotilla.

As mentioned, the town has recently adopted an extremely liberal outlook and its first gay bar was founded in 1962. Unfortunately, there was a backlash from the Spanish regime in the 1970s who arrested many homosexuals.

The name Torre (Tower) and Molino (Mill) reflects the many water mills that once covered the area of which only one survives (Molino de Inca).

In the 1950s such celebrities as Orson Welles and Frank Sinatra visited the resort.

So, if you have the opportunity to visit Torremolinos, you will discover lots to do like visiting Aqualand (largest water park on the Costa del Sol) and the old bullring where there is a public market twice a week, plus other exciting events.

The Parque de la Bateria is a lovely public park and has a boating lake and a children's playground etc. It also possesses one of the best sports facilities in Europe namely the stadium "Cuidad de Torremolinos".

The hotel we chose for our holiday was situated near Malaga Airport and was extremely clean and the staff were helpful and friendly. The buffet food was brilliant and catered for vegetarians.

I would recommend that you visit Torremolinos if you want a fun-filled holiday, or just want to take it easy.

BRENDA'S WILDLIFE CORNER

<u>Lions</u>

The lion (Leo) is a species in the family Felidae; it is a deep-chested cat with short, rounded head reduced neck and ears. The male has a head-to-body length of 184-208 cm (72-82 inch) while the female is 160-184 cm (63-72 inch).

A lion pride consists of a number of adult males, females and cubs. Groups of females normally hunt together and hunt mostly large animals. A lion is a

predator although some will scavenge if necessary. They have been known to hunt humans but this is not typical of the species.

The lion inhabits grasslands and savannas but not dense forests. The lion is more alert than other big cats and tends to roam at night and at twilight.

Historically, in Pleistocene time, the lion was spread throughout Eurasia, Africa and North America. Today it has been reduced to certain populations in Sub-Saharan Africa and has become an endangered species in Western India. – the cause of the decline is not known although conflicts with humans are a possible reason.

The lion is a widely recognised symbol in human culture and has been depicted in sculptures and paintings, on national flags and in films and literature.

Lions have been kept in dens since the time of the Roman Empire and have been sought for exhibitions in zoological gardens around the world since the late 18th century. In the Palaeolithic period, carvings and paintings of lions have been found in caves in France, and have been dated to 17,000 years ago.

The lion's closest relatives are the tiger, snow leopard, jaguar and the leopard.

SHEEP AND THEIR SHEPHERD

John 6.29

Most assuredly, I say to you, he who does not enter the sheepfold by the door, but climbs up some other way, the same is a thief and a robber.

But he who enters by the door is the shepherd of the sheep.

To him the doorkeeper opens, and the sheep hear his voice: and he calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. And when he brings out his own sheep, he goes before them: and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. John 10:1-4 (NKJV)

This is the start of the passage where Jesus explains how he is the shepherd, and we are his sheep.

And very significantly, it shows us how Jesus looks at sheep, and by extension, at other sentient animals, (that is: animals capable of sensation or feeling).

The sheep are individuals. They have names. They know the voice of their shepherd. They are not just nameless wool-bearing lumps of meat.

Anyone with a dog or a cat knows that animals have a personality. They recognise their owner. They can be excited and happy, and they can be afraid and miserable.

A human being is made up of a spirit, a soul, and a body. (1 Thess 5:23, Hebrews 4:12). The spirit is the subconscious - the 'heart' (warm or cold, kind or hard). The soul is the conscious mind.

When a sentient animal recognises someone or displays emotions, this is the working of its conscious mind, its soul.

So, a dog or a cat - or a sheep or a pig or a horse - has a soul. (In contrast: a human foetus 12 weeks after conception does not have a conscious mind, a soul).

John 6.29

"And the merchants of the earth weep and mourn over her, because no-one buys their cargo any more: cargo of gold and silver and precious stones and pearls; and fine linen and purple and silk and scarlet; and every kind of citron wood, ivory vessel and precious wooden vessel; and bronze and iron and marble; and cinnamon and incense and fragrant oil and frankincense; and wine and oil and fine flour and wheat; and cattle and sheep and horses and chariots; and bodies and souls of men."

Revelation 18:11-13

This passage speaks of the fall of 'Babylon', the great harlot clothed in purple and scarlet, who sits on a scarlet beast. And it evokes echoes of recent world events.

But what is Babylon? Members of one religion will sometimes say that Babylon is a different religion which they do not like, but this is wrong.

Revelation 18:24 offers a clue: "And in her was found the blood of prophets and saints, and of all who were slain on the earth" (NKJV).

Three things in history have led to people killing large numbers of their fellow human beings: money, tribalism, and autocratic religion.

MORE OF JUNE'S RECIPES

Bourbon Biscuits

Ingredients:

4 oz of plain flour
½ level teaspoon of baking powder
½ oz of cocoa
2 oz of butter
2 oz of caster sugar
1 level teaspoon of golden syrup

Filling:

1 oz of plain chocolate (melted)
 1 ½ tablespoons of water
 2 oz of icing sugar (sifted)
 Vanilla essence to taste

Method:

Sift together flour, baking powder and cocoa. Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy and beat in the syrup. Stir in half flour mixture. Turn dough onto working surface and knead the remaining flour mixture. Roll out to $\frac{1}{4}$ inch thick on greaseproof paper, sprinkle top with granulated sugar and press in with rolling pin. Cut dough into neat fingers 1 x 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches and carefully lift on to greased baking sheet. Prick each biscuit two or three times and bake at gas mark 3 (325 F) for 15-20 minutes. Cool. Beat all ingredients for filling together making sure mixture is cool and a soft consistency before sandwiching biscuits in pairs.

Chicken Pot Roast

Ingredients:

2lb of small new potatoes, scrubbed
2¹/₂ - 3lb of boiling fowl, jointed
4 oz of bacon rashes
1 large carrot, diced
1 small turnip, diced
4 oz of peas
4 oz of mushrooms
1 teaspoon of mixed herbs

White stock Clove of garlic Salt and pepper

Method:

Choose a heavy based pan or ovenproof casserole dish and line the base with rashers of bacon. Place in the chicken joints packing them tightly together. Add in layers the vegetables finishing with the small new potatoes on top and season with salt and pepper. Add sufficient stock to cover half way up the pan. Sprinkle with herbs. Rub the inside of the lid with the clove of garlic and place on lid, making sure it is fitting closely. Cook very slowly on top of the cooker for 3 hours, or if in a casserole, place in the oven at 300 F (150 C)/gas mark 2 for $2\frac{1}{2}$ -3 hours.



Creole Rabbit Pie

Ingredients:

- 8 oz of rough puff or flaky pastry 1 rabbit
- i rabbit
- 2 oz of minced bacon
- 2 cooking apples (peeled and sliced)
- 1 onion (peeled and sliced)
- 2 tablespoons of flour
- 1 dessertspoon of curry powder
- Salt and pepper
- Pinch of mixed herbs

1 dessertspoon of chopped parsley

2 clovesPinch of mixed spices1 teaspoon of Worcester sauce1 dessertspoon of lemon juice

Method:

Wash rabbit and cut into portions. Soak for $\frac{1}{2}$ hour in salted water. Place in pan and cover with hot water. Bring to the boiling point, add salt, cloves, spices and herbs. Simmer gently for 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours and remove to cool. Roll rabbit in flour mixed with curry powder. Place in bottom of greased pie dish, cover with layers of onion and apple. Top with minced bacon and chopped parsley and pour over stock and lemon juice. Roll pastry to $\frac{1}{4}$ inch thickness. Cover pie with pastry, trim edges, decorate if desired and glaze with milk. Bake in hot oven mark 8 (450 F) for 10 minutes, reduce heat to moderate mark 5 (375 F) and cook for a further 40 – 50 minutes.
