DO YOU THINK THERE SHOULD BE A LEGAL LIMIT TO PERSONAL WEALTH?

This is a very interesting question, one that I had not seriously considered until now. I think there are arguments both for and against having such a limit. Here are my opinions on the matter.

Firstly, the pros. Some people have what many would see as an obscene amount of

personal wealth. Do those people actually need all that money? As the old saying goes "money is the root of all evil" - would a legal limit on wealth perhaps reduce that evil ever so slightly? Would it result in less conflict in the world? Money has sometimes been cited as the real reason behind conflicts, one that springs to mind is the situation over the years in Northern Ireland. The most important question is who gets to decide what the legal limit should be?

In an ideal world, this question probably should not even need asking. One thing is for sure, on a personal basis, I will never be in a situation where I have to worry about breaching such a limit as long as it wasn't set at a relatively low level!

People who work hard to earn money should be allowed uncapped personal wealth, however, we are living in a self-entitled generation and the words (working hard to earn is somewhat a non-starter.) The internet and social media have taken over and has/is causing an epidemic of unemployment. We have lost a number of retail chains, not just due to covid but because of the way shopping habits have changed mainly by the younger generation and the older generations have had to adapt to the changes.

We now have a generation with new ways of making wealth who are called "Celebrities" who have become famous off the back of reality TV such as Love Island or apps like YouTube/TikTok etc. The list goes on.... These "Celebrities" are or are becoming self-made millionaires off the back of influencing/advertising products, which is/has dissolved the high-street shops and taken so many jobs away from the retail industry and TV advertising! From personal experience, a lot of the younger generation I know, some are couples with children who have jobs, others are single parents with no earned income because they chose to have or keep having children or create health issues in order not to work and rely on the state, including those who chose to commit fraud by fleecing people who have earned or inherited their own personal wealth!

Some people who choose not to work are usually the ones who have a self-entitled attitude and think they are owed by hard working tax payers. They choose to receive anything for FREE and constantly complain about child poverty! If you look deeper into some of these households, the children have the latest clothes and footwear, computer software which includes tablets, PlayStation, and Xbox, a car in the household and occasional holidays abroad or within the UK!

NEWCASTLE



Newcastle initially grew from a Roman settlement called Pons Aelius which had a population of approximately 2,000. When the Romans left Britain in 410 A.D, Newcastle was absorbed by the Anglo-Saxon kingdom of Northumbria and was known as Munucceaster (often modernised to

Monkchester) but, unfortunately, conflicts with the Danes in 867 almost destroyed the settlements along the River Tyne.

In 1080, following the Norman invasion of Britain, Robert Curthose (Son of William the Conqueror) built a wooden castle in Newcastle (because of its strategic position) which became known as Novum Castellum or New Castle. In 1087, the wooden structure was replaced by a stone one and was then once again rebuilt in 1172 during the reign of Henry II. Interestingly, Scots King William the Lion was locked up in the castle in 1174.

In the thirteenth century, a huge stone wall was erected around the town to prevent attacks from invaders during the Border War against Scotland. Then, in 1400, Henry IV separated Newcastle from the county of Northumberland and it became a county in its own right known as Newcastle upon Tyne. A new charter was also granted by Elizabeth I in 1589.

During the fourteenth century, the wool trade was the main contributor to Newcastle's economy, followed much later by coal mining and ship building. It is worth mentioning the Sandgate area of Newcastle, which is where keelmen and their families lived and worked and were responsible for the transference of coal from the river banks to the waiting colliers, for export to London and other places in the UK.

Unfortunately, over 7,000 of 20,000 inhabitants perished in the 1630s during the Plague which was devastating for Newcastle, and, tragically a further 53 people lost their lives in 1854 with the Great Fire of Newcastle and Gateshead.

A print industry thrived in the area in the eighteenth century and it also gained a reputation for producing excellent flint glass. On the third of June 1882, Newcastle became a city following St. Nicholas' Church becoming a cathedral.

Newcastle was very important during the Industrial Revolution boasting a great shipbuilding industry and a healthy, heavy engineering sector – which declined in the second part of the twentieth century. It was also one of the first cities in the world to be illuminated by electric lighting and also introduced such innovations as the safety lamp, electric light bulbs and the steam turbine.

In the twentieth century, electric trams ran on the streets of the city but these were gradually replaced by trolley buses from 1935, though these stopped running in 1950. As cars became popular, the roads in and around Newcastle were improved and Redheugh Bridge and Tyne Bridge were opened. The city's first art galleries were opened in the early part of that century (the Laing Art Gallery and Hatton Gallery) and two museums were also opened at this time: The Museum of Science and Industry and the John G Joicey Museum.

There was a big effort made from the 1920s to the 1970s to replace inner-city slums with council housing and a lot of private housing being built. And in the 1930s, Newcastle witnessed a record rise in unemployment. In addition, 141 people lost their lives during World War II air raids which also culminated in 587 injuries.

The second half of the twentieth century, saw the demise of coal mines, heavy industry and ship yards on the banks of the River Tyne which were partly replaced by the office, service and retail sectors over a period of years. Importantly, Newcastle University was founded in 1963 and a polytechnic in 1969 – which became Northumbria University in 1992.

Today, the city of Newcastle is the most populous in the North East of England and possesses mainly a medieval street layout with alleys or 'chares' which need to be accessed on foot. Much of the architecture was designed in the 1830s by Richard Grainger and John Dobson in a style that is called 'Tyneside Classical'. Many of these buildings are now listed. People of this area are known as 'Geordies' and local delicacies are Pease Pudding and Stottie Cake.

Normally, Newcastle is a fabulous place to have a night out with many pubs, bars and nightclubs around the Bigg Market and the Quayside area of the city centre. There is also 'The Pink Triangle' on Times Square where many LGBT-friendly bars and clubs are to be found. You could also pay a visit to Chinatown or one of the many other excellent international restaurants in the city.

If you enjoy a trip to the theatre, Newcastle has many to offer like The Theatre Royal, The Live Theatre and The People's Theatre. There are also annual fairs and festivals to consider attending such as the Hoppings funfair on the Town Moor, Newcastle Beer Festival and Newcastle Mela. The largest music venue is the Metro Radio Arena opened in 1995 and which seats 11,000 people. Some people may be interested in visiting one or more of the city's interesting museums or galleries, or spending time in Leazes Park.

If you fancy a bit of retail therapy, then why not visit the shops on Northumberland Street or those on Grainger Street and also the area around Grey's Monument?

Sport is very popular in the Newcastle area and the city boasts the great Newcastle United (not forgetting Newcastle United Women's Football Club) as well as non-league clubs like Newcastle Benfield. There is also the rugby union team Newcastle Falcons and the rugby league team Newcastle Thunder. If you like Speedway, you could maybe pay a visit to Brough Park in Byker to watch the Newcastle Diamonds. It would be remiss of me not to mention the Great North Run which starts in Newcastle or the great horse racing at Gosforth Park.

So maybe a trip to Newcastle might be a good idea as the city has so much to offer the visitor. You can easily fly into the area at the Newcastle International Airport (situated at Woolsington), use the excellent bus services, Newcastle Railway Station or go via the very adequate road network.

Geordies are reputed to be a very friendly lot, so why not visit Newcastle and find out for yourself!

Album: Life by Misadventure

I purchased this album based on the reputation of the artist alongside the fact that I loved the song "Human" from his debut album of the same name.

This is his second album and like "Human" it has topped the UK Album charts, so he has a one hundred per cent record to date in that respect. This album has fifteen tracks with a running time of just over fifty-four minutes.

I have seen a comment elsewhere that this album is stripped back and I can totally understand that. There are times whilst listening to this that it seems like a case of one man and his guitar.

The tracks that stood out to me initially were "Anywhere Away from Here", a duet with Pink that has already been released as a single and "Crossfire". The opening track "Fireflies" has also grown on me after a few listens. The final track is a solo version of "Anywhere Away from Here", which is not bad at all but I prefer the duet with Pink. Maybe that is purely because I have become accustomed to hearing that version, you can judge for yourself when you have a listen.

The first single released from the album was track eight, "All You Ever Wanted", this is one of the more upbeat numbers on the album and you can see why it was selected as the lead single. For me there is a hint of George Ezra about this track.

One of the saddest songs is "Talking to Myself" which apparently is about Rag'n'Bone Man's recent divorce.


There are a couple of obvious quirks with the album. Firstly, the spoken opening to track ten, "Somewhere Along the Way", which I have grown to like, and secondly the close to track fourteen, "Old Habits", which appears to have ended and then continues after a short pause.

I can hear a similarity with Eric Clapton in "Somewhere Along the Way" but that might be down to the style more that the fact that he actually sounds like him. As an aside, there are various times whilst listening to the album that I can hear a bit of Cat Stevens about his vocals.

There is no doubt that Rory Charles Graham (his real name) is a very talented singer but it took me a few listens to get into this album. The album is more blues and soul orientated than pop music. If you like a good ballad or you like to sit and think, whilst listening to music, this is probably going to be your type of album, although there are a few more up-tempo tracks here. I think his existing fans will like the album, primarily because it mainly features the type of songs that I think they would expect from him.

BRENDA'S WILDLIFE CORNER



<u>Platypus</u>

The platypus is a duck-billed semiaquatic, egg-laying mammal which is found mainly in Eastern Australia and Tasmania. The platypus is the only mammal that lays eggs in order to reproduce instead of giving birth to live young.

European naturalists were baffled by the animal when they first came across it although Aboriginal people of Australia used to hunt it for

food and for its fur, but it is now a protected species. Captive breeding programs however, have only limited success and although the platypus is now vulnerable to the effects of pollution, it is true to say that it is no longer under threat of extinction. It is now a legally protected species in all Australian states where it occurs and is only listed as an endangered species in South Australia. It even features on the reverse of the Australian twenty cent coin and is the animal emblem of New South Wales.

Although the size of the platypus differs from region to region, the average male is about twenty inches in length while the female is about seventeen inches. In captivity it has been known to live until seventeen years of age but in the wild they obviously die much younger.

It is an excellent swimmer and spends much of its time searching for food and interestingly, all four of its feet are webbed. It is a carnivore and feeds on worms, insect larvae, freshwater shrimp etc. The platypus uses cheek-pouches to carry prey to the surface where it can then devour it.

In the past, Aboriginal Australians believed the animal was a hybrid of a duck and water rat because of its physical attributes but now it is a respected and valued part of Australian wildlife.

GRAHAM'S SPORTING CORNER



Welcome to the latest in a series of articles which aim to increase people's awareness of particular sports, their origins, their rules, popular events within that sport and much, much, more.

This month we are going to take a look at tennis:

Tennis is a racket sport. It is most commonly played by two individuals

(singles) although, doubles (two players per team) is also very popular, especially in a social setting. The game is played on an area known as a tennis court. The court is marked out with lines.

The object of the game is to move the ball in a way that means your opponent is unable to return it, in a valid manner, and prevent them from scoring a point. The parts of the court in which a player needs to return the ball, to make it a valid return, vary slightly between singles matches and doubles matches. The main on court tennis match official is referred to as an umpire.

Tennis is governed by the International Tennis Federation (ITF). It is also an Olympic (and Paralympic) sport. The game is believed to have first been played in England during the 19th century and was originally referred to as lawn tennis. This is as a result of its close association to other lawn games, such as bowls, croquet and an older racket sport, known as real tennis. It was in fact real tennis which people first used the term tennis in association with.

The rules of tennis have not changed a great deal in over 125 years. The main exceptions being the rule that the server had to have one foot on the ground, between 1908 and 1961, the introduction of tiebreaks in the 1970s and the adoption of electronic review technology, which was subsequently added to with the player challenge system. This system is known as

Hawk-Eye, it allows the players to query line decisions where they feel they need to dispute the allocation of a point.

There are four major professional tournaments played throughout the year. These tournaments are the Australian Open, the French Open, Wimbledon and the US Open. Collectively they are known as the Grand Slam events, and a player who wins all four tournaments in a calendar year, or each one consecutively, is said to have done the "Grand Slam". If a player manages to win each of these tournaments at least once during their career, it is called a "Career Grand Slam".

The Australian Open and the US Open are played on a hard-court surface. The French Open is played on a clay surface and Wimbledon is played on the more traditional natural grass court surface. There are singles and doubles competitions for both men and women at all these events, along with a mixed doubles tournament. The men's matches are decided over the best of five sets, the women's and mixed matches are decided over three sets.

Away from the major tournaments there are events held all over the world throughout the year. The Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP) run the men's world tour events and the Women's Tennis Association (WTA) run the women's world tour events. They both allocate points for performances at these events to create individual world rankings. Points are also scored at the Grand Slam tournaments, the difference being that the ITF run those particular events.

The most successful male players in the history of tennis include Switzerland's Roger Federer and Spain's Rafael Nadal who have both won 20 Grand Slam singles titles, at the time of writing.

The most successful female players in the history of tennis include Australia's Margaret Court, who 24 Grand Slam singles titles, Serena Williams from the USA, who has 23 Grand Slam singles titles and Germany's Steffi Graf who won 22 Grand Slam singles titles.

I hope you have enjoyed this look at the sport of tennis.

MORE OF JUNE'S EXCITING RECIPES

Potato Crisp Pie

Ingredients:

2 large waxy potatoes, sliced
2 oz of butter or margarine
1 skinned chicken breast fillet (about 6 oz)
2 crushed garlic cloves
4 sliced spring onions
1 oz of flour
³/₄ cup of dry white wine
2/3 cup of double (heavy) cream
8 oz of broccoli florets
4 large, sliced tomatoes
3 oz of sliced, Gruyere cheese
1 cup of natural yoghurt
1/3 cup of rolled, toasted oats

Method:

Cook the potatoes in a pan of boiling water for 10 minutes. Drain and set aside. Meanwhile, melt the butter in a frying pan. Cut the chicken into strips and cook for 5 minutes, turning. Add the garlic and spring onions and cook for a further 2 minutes. Stir in the flour and cook for 1 minute. Gradually add the wine and cream. Bring to the boil, stirring then reduce the heat until the sauce is simmering. Then cook for 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, blanch the broccoli in boiling water, drain and refresh in cold water. Place half of the potatoes in the base of a pie dish and top with half of the tomatoes and half of the broccoli. Spoon the chicken sauce on top and repeat with the layers in the same order once more.

Arrange the Gruyere cheese on top and spoon over the yoghurt. Sprinkle with the oats and cook in a preheated oven at 200 C or 400 or gas mark 6 for 25 minutes until the top is golden brown. Serve the pie immediately.



Savoury Dumplings

Ingredients:

6 oz of flour2 oz of breadcrumbs3 oz of chopped parsleyA pinch of chopped thymeSalt and pepper

Method:

Mix all the ingredients thoroughly and add just enough cold water to make a stiff paste. Divide into 8 pieces and roll into balls. Cook for half an hour on the broth, keeping the pan covered.



1lb chipolata sausages

Method:

<u>Toad in The Hole</u>

Ingredients:

½ pint of milk or half milk/half water
1 egg
4 oz of plain flour
Salt
½ oz of lard or equivalent

Place the milk and egg into a blender and blend until smooth. Gradually add the flour and a pinch of salt and continue blending until smooth. Leave to stand for 30 minutes. Preheat the oven for 10 minutes. Place the lard in a shallow dish approximately 25 cm x 30 cm (10" x 12") and heat in the oven for 10 minutes. Add the sausages, pour over the batter and cook until the batter is golden brown.



Old Fashioned Ginger Nut Biscuits

Ingredients:

10 oz of plain flour 7 oz of sugar (half caster sugar and half soft brown sugar)

1 teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda

2 teaspoons of ground ginger

11/2 teaspoons of baking powder

6 oz of margarine1 tablespoon of golden syrup or clear honey2 tablespoons of milk

Method:

Preheat the oven to 160 C. Place all the dry ingredients in a mixing bowl Melt the margarine and syrup over a gentle heat, making sure it does not boil. Pour this mixture into the dry ingredients, add milk and mix thoroughly. Shape into 35 small balls and place on a greased baking sheet, spread well apart and flatten slightly. The biscuits spread to about 2" across. Bake for 16-18 minutes until browned. Leave to cool on the tray.
