GRAHAM'S PARALYMPICS 2024 REVIEW



Following on from the 2024 Olympic Games, the Paralympics also took place in Paris between 28th August and 8th September 2024.

I am writing this article just before the closing ceremony is about to take place. The games have been seen as a major success and, from a British perspective, Team GB have performed magnificently to finish second in the medal table. They have surpassed 120 medals in total, including 49 gold medals, the latter being eight more than they achieved at the previous games in Tokyo. Having said that China almost doubled that number of gold medals

and achieved 220 medals in total.

22 sports have been involved in the games. Some of the sports may be a little less known to the general public. The ones that spring to mind is boccia and goalball. Who have been the big stars of the games? Well, starting with Team GB, Hannah Cockroft, who comes from the same town as me, now has 9 Paralympics gold medals. She retained her 100 metres and 800 metres titles in Paris, thus claiming three consecutive wins in each event. Iona Winnifrith became Britain's youngest medallist when she claimed a silver medal in the 100 metres breaststroke at the ripe old age of 13. Poppy Maskill was making her games debut, but she was not overawed by the occasion and was Team GB's most

successful athlete by winning 3 gold medals and 2 silver medals in the pool. Cyclist Dame Sarah Storey was already our most decorated athlete with 28 previous medals. She added to this with two more gold medals in Paris. The team took 10 members to the games for the rowing events, and they all won medals.

Before moving on, we should mention David Weir. He has been representing Team GB at the games since 1996. He failed to add to his medal tally, including 6 previous golds, but still managed to compete effectively in the 1500 metres, 5000 metres and marathon in his final games at the age of 45.

International stars at the games included US athlete Jessica Long. She won 2 gold medals in the pool on her sixth appearance at the Paralympics, having first competed in Athens in 2004. Jiang Yuyan of China amazingly won 7 gold medals, again in swimming. Her teammate Guo Jincheng also managed a superb 4 golds and 2 silvers. Elsewhere Thailand's 50-year-old Saysunee Jana won 3 gold medals in wheelchair fencing. She won the epee, sabre and foil events, whilst also claiming a bronze medal in the team epee.

Some athletes competing at the Paris games will be remembered even though they did not win any medals. One of these was Bhutan's Kinzang Lhamo. She finished eightieth, and last, in the marathon, 50 minutes behind the winner. When she crossed the line, there were large cheers for her. She had walked part of the route, but she stuck to her task and won the hearts of all in attendance when she finished. Many felt that this was the essence of what the Paralympics is all about.

I think that is a good place to end this review of a very successful and well-received games.

"I BELIEVE I'M NOT A CONSPIRACY THEORIST"

I'm not a conspiracy theorist; I strive to maintain an open mind. However, there's a growing sense in the UK of a "New World Order" taking shape. Several developments fuel this concern.

COVID-19 and the ensuing pandemic have served as a distraction. While the public's attention was elsewhere, new laws were quietly introduced that threaten to dismantle travelling communities, curtail the right to protest, and suppress our cherished freedom of speech. I encourage you to research these developments further.

The recent lengthy imprisonment of Just Stop Oil protesters is further evidence. While they arguably broke the law and deserve punishment, their sentences raise concerns about disproportionate responses. As Deborah Meaden, the well-known entrepreneur from the BBC television program *Dragon's Den*, tweeted:

"I find it very alarming that so many agree with the protest sentence. It doesn't matter whether you agree with JSO (Just Stop Oil), it matters that you have the right to protest... this is a legal overreach and we should all be worried."

Numerous instances in both the UK and the USA exemplify this "legal overreach." Both governments appear to be suppressing their citizens' freedom of speech. This is a slippery slope, growing more serious each day. Without freedom of speech, we become subjects of the state, not participants in a democracy.

Climate change is a pressing reality, yet meaningful action remains limited. While many words are spoken and efforts made, genuine change will only come when we embrace plant-based diets, stop exploiting animals for food, and recognise our individual environmental impact. Think local, act global.

This government uses climate change as a distraction. The Ultra Low Emission Zone (ULEZ) seems more about control than environmental protection. An increasing number of cameras are being installed, ostensibly for safety and security, yet the ease with which they enable tracking raises concerns about surveillance and control, not enhanced security.

The gap between rich and poor is widening, with more people falling into poverty while a minority amass vast wealth. This disparity is evident on many levels.

If you dismiss these concerns as conspiracy theories, I urge you to conduct your research and draw your own conclusions.

BRENDA'S WILDLIFE CORNER



The Wolf

The wolf is a very interesting mammal. It is a carnivore, mainly feeding on large, hooved mammals as well as on livestock, carrion and garbage. It will also eat hares, insectivores and rodents if necessary. It lives predominantly where prey is abundant, like in forests, shrublands, grasslands, deserts, pastures, wetlands and rocky peaks on mountains. This

animal can exist in very cold climates as its fur offers better insulation than dog fur.

Physically, the wolf is a very powerful animal with a broad snout, short ears, short torso and a longer tail than coyotes and jackals. It has a slender build to enable it to move swiftly and overcome deep snow. Its teeth are extremely strong and can even crush bone. An average wolf is 1.05-1.66 m in length, though their weight differs depending on whether they are located: in Europe (38.5 kg), North America (36 kg) or India and Arabia (25 kg). Females are smaller than males.

Single or mated pairs are more successful when hunting and can thus successfully tackle prey much larger than itself. In fact, the wolf is the most specialised of all species for cooperative game hunting. It is important to note that wolves rarely attack humans unless they are rabid.

The reproductive life of the wolf is also very interesting. They are monogamous, although a replacement is quickly found if one of the partners dies. A wolf becomes sexually mature from the age of 3 years, and females usually have one litter of pups per year. Older females have larger litters than younger ones. A pup is born blind and deaf, although they develop at a fast rate and even accompany adult wolves on hunts for large prey the following autumn.

Finally, the wolf is able to communicate effectively through vocalisation, body postures and scent marking.Ref. Wikipedia

MORE SUCCULENT RECIPES FROM JUNE CHARLTON

Birthday Cake

Ingredients:

8 oz of self-raising flour

1 teaspoon of mixed spice

5 oz of caster sugar

5 oz of butter

6 oz of currants

6 oz of sultanas

2 oz of chopped peel

2 eggs beaten with 6 tablespoons of milk

Method:

Mix flour and spice. Clean and mix the fruit. Beat butter and sugar to a cream in a warm basin. Beat eggs and milk together. Stir a little at a time the flour mixture, and the eggs and milk with the butter and sugar. Add the fruits last. Mix thoroughly. Line a 7" cake tin (3" deep) with greased paper and pour in the mixture. Bake for $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours – the first hour in a moderate oven 350 - 375 F (gas mark 3-4), then in a slow oven at 250 F (gas mark 1-2).



London Buns

Ingredients:

8 oz of self-raising flour

½ teaspoon of salt

2 oz of margarine

2 oz of sugar

1 oz of peel (cut fine)

1 egg beaten – put aside a tablespoon for tops

2 tablespoons of milk

A few drops of essence of lemon

Method:

Mix the flour and salt in a basin. Rub in the margarine. Add the sugar and finely shredded peel. Add the beaten egg. Add a few drops of essence of lemon to the milk and mix in to form a dough. Divide into 8 portions, forming into buns using well-floured hands. Place on greased baking tray or sheet. Brush over with egg and sprinkle with coarse sugar. Bake in a hot oven at 425 - 450 F/gas mark 6-7 for about 20 minutes.

Potato Moussaka

Ingredients:



2 oz of butter Parsley Salt and pepper White sauce:

 $1 \frac{1}{2}$ lb of potatoes, thinly sliced

12 oz of fresh mince

8 oz can of tomatoes

4 oz of onion

1 oz of butter 1 oz of flour ½ pint of milk 1 oz of grated cheddar cheese 1 beaten egg Salt and pepper

Method:

Fry the meat, onion and tomatoes in the butter. Cover the base of a greased casserole dish with overlapping potato slices and season. Cover with a layer of meat mixture. Repeat until all the ingredients are used, finishing with a layer of potato. Add the beaten egg and cheese to the white sauce and pour into the casserole. Bake at 375 F (gas mark 5), for approximately 1 hour. Sprinkle with chopped parsley.



Ginger Pudding

Ingredients:

8 oz of self-raising flour ½ teaspoon of salt 1 teaspoon of ground ginger 2 oz of margarine or suet 2 tablespoons of sugar 2 tablespoons of treacle

Three tablespoons of milk – an egg may be used instead of milk if desired

Method:

Mix the flour, salt and ginger and rub in the margarine or suet. Add the other ingredients and mix well. Put into a well-greased basin and steam for $2 - 2\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

GRAHAM'S GIG REVIEW



On Sunday 25th August 2024, I ventured out to the Piece Hall, a wonderful outdoor venue in my hometown of Halifax, to see the band Jungle.

Jungle is a band who have been together for more than a decade. However, it is only in the last six months or so that I have really been aware of them. In fact, it was only a few weeks before this gig that I learnt they won the Best British Band award at the 2024 BRIT Awards.

I first heard a couple of their tracks in a local café and started to take notice of them from then onwards. I saw their performance at this year's Glastonbury Festival on my television and subsequently purchased all four of their studio albums released to date.

What kind of music is it? Well, they are a dance music project. They perform a fusion of disco, soul, funk and some pop. Add in a touch of rap/hip-hop and plenty of falsetto vocals and I would say that just about covers it. I had an idea what to expect from the gig, however it exceeded even my expectations.

I spent the entire evening dancing as they quite simply don't do many, if any, slower songs! They opened with their best-known song "Busy Earnin" and finished with, what in my opinion is their best song, "Keep Moving". The latter was the only song in their encore. They were on stage for around an hour and twenty minutes. That might seem a little short in comparison to the length of many other gigs, however the entertainment during that time was probably better than the majority of gigs I have ever attended. I have been to four gigs at this venue this year, and this was easily the most entertaining of them all.

Because of the type of music they play, the set list was seamless. It is arranged in such a way that Lydia Kitto takes centre stage around halfway through the show and her vocals come to the fore from this point on. They played all of my favourites including "Candle Flame", "Back on 74", "Casio" and "You Ain't No Celebrity".

I did wonder how they would manage to perform "I've Been in Love" as it includes a rap by Channel Tres, but they managed to incorporate his vocals and his image on a massive backdrop behind them on stage. Very impressive! In fact, the graphics and lighting effects are a big part of their performance.

The audience was very eclectic. I saw plenty of young people. There were older couples as well and some parents with their kids. They are the kind of band who will appeal to the majority of folk. Some of their songs include explicit language, but this does not detract from

the overall quality of the music on offer.

They released a new single titled "Let's Go Back" a few days before I wrote this article. I would recommend taking a listen to it to get a feel for what they are all about, and I would recommend going to see them to get the full experience if you like it!
